# **BOOMER'S LEGACY**


Initially a "stay at home Mom", Maureen Eykelenboom returned to school and then worked as a coordinator of volunteers in Alberta hospitals until her family moved to Comox in 1999. There, her strong commitment to helping others continued through multiple volunteer activities. Her world changed in 2006.

That August Cpl. Andrew "Boomer" Eykelenboom was killed in action in Afghanistan. Mindful of her son's passion towards helping people, Maureen put her heart and soul into the creation of Boomer's Legacy Foundation. The foundation raises and provides funds to projects that "carry on Andrew's desire to provide humanitarian assistance to people wherever and whenever Canadian Forces are deployed".

Since 2006, projects based in Afghanistan have been as diverse as providing school supplies and shoes to children to replacing a herd of sheep killed by Taliban forces. In Kosovo in 2011 a \$10,000 donation improved a Women and Children's Shelter; while the same year in Jamaica, \$6,000 enhanced a technical school dedicated to improving the lives of impoverished youth.

The most prominent fundraising events are annual bike rides. The first was from Comox to Victoria, and now there is a similar ride in Ottawa, with Alberta and Nova Scotia following later this year. Maureen cycles



An interesting concept was tested at this wine tasting. Six red wines from Spain were served to each guest, in

glasses marked 1-6. The object was to rate each wine out of 100 using the Wine Spectator 100 point scale. Unbeknownst to all but the hosts - there were really only 3 individual wines, each served twice. The second serving, however, was spun for 30 seconds in a blender just prior to pouring! Bob wanted to know whether this severe aerating was helpful or not to the wine taste.

When the group score was calculated by averaging individual scores, the result was a significant degradation for the Beronia but not much difference for the other two. Halfway through the tasting Bob and Heather served a delightful selection of Spanish food specialties that truly enhanced the wines.
